think that only Jehovah's Witnesses, and no one else, will be entitled to God's eternal rewards. They accomplish this by concocting an absurd list of directives that no normal church or Christian congregation could ever be tricked into believing to have come from God (or even be considered <u>sane</u> for that matter). Then they force their followers to honor those absurd directives with threats of expulsion, shunning, ridicule, and forfeiture of God's eternal rewards (even resurrection). Included in this list of absurd directives is forbidding the celebration of holidays (and family birthdays), requiring non-involvement with government by forbidding them from voting in elections or holding public office (or even serving in the military), requiring refusal of life-saving blood transfusions, and hyperbolizing the word of Jehovah. While each of these un-Biblical directives are worthy of our disdain, the small size of this booklet limits us to only a brief discussion of their aggrandizement of the word Jehovah. We will address the balance of those absurdities on another occasion.

DOES GOD SAY HE PREFERS THE NAME JEHOVAH?

As previously stated the Watchtower Corporation uses "exceptionalism" as a tool of recruitment and indoctrination. They want their current and potential followers (or rather their uncompensated laborers), to believe that only Jehovah's Witnesses will be entitled to God's eternal rewards. One way they accomplish this is by manufacturing a false sense of importance toward trivialities. One of those trivialities is the word "JEHOVAH." They try to convince everyone that God wants to be called Jehovah and because, according to them, they alone call God by this name they are exceptional among all other religions for being the only people who "truly obey God." This falsehood regarding the supposed importance to God of the word Jehovah has no Biblical foundation whatsoever, as we now demonstrate:

The Bible is clear as to what God prefers to be called, and it is <u>not</u> Jehovah. In fact, the word Jehovah doesn't even exist, but more on that later.

In about 1491 B.C. when the Israelites were held captive by Pharaoh Ramses II of Egypt, God called Moses to deliver them from their captivity. When Moses asked God what he should say to the Israelites if they were to ask him what God calls himself, this is how God answered Moses:

And God said unto Mō'şeş, I AM THAT I AM: and he said, Thus shalt thou say unto the children of \bar{I} s'ra-el, I AM hath sent me unto you. (Exodus 3:14).

If the Watchtower Corporation were telling the truth with their claim that God demands to be called "Jehovah," God would have said to Moses something to the effect of "Tell them that Jehovah sent you." Because it is apparent that God does not

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think that only Jehovah's Witnesses, and no one else, will be entitled to God's eternal rewards. Misleading everyone about the importance of the word Jehovah* is just one example of the many false teachings of the Watchtower Corporation and the Jehovah's Witness organization. Hopefully this small booklet will help convince at least one betrayed individual trapped within their web of deceit to do some independent research outside of the Watchtower Corporation's mill of false information in order to find the truth.

We sincerely wish goodwill toward anyone who seeks the truth about the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and we earnestly pray for God's guidance to anyone that bravely steps out by faith to "try the spirits whether they are of God: because many false prophets are gone out into the world." (I John 4:1).

* The word Jehovah appears in the Authorized (King James) Version in only seven instances but not because the translators considered the word Jehovah to be an accurate representation of the Tetragrammaton, but rather because they opined that each of the seven particular contexts required a proper noun, the word Jehovah was already popularized as the name for God by the Masoretes, who God used through the early Medieval Period of history to preserve the Old Testament. In Exodus 6:3 Moses records that God told him of the times when He appeared to the patriarchs Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, yet they knew Him <u>not</u> by the name JEHOVAH but rather as God Almighty [בְּאֵל שֵׁדְּי (transliterated 'el Shadday). In Psalm 83:18 the translators reflected God, speaking through Asaph (Psalm 83 is the last of Twelve Psalms of Asaph), desiring to distinguish Himself as being the highest among all others on the Earth.

In Genesis 22:14, Exodus 17:15, and Judges 6:24 the word Jehovah was included within the proper names of the geographic locations, or the names of the alters constructed on sites within those locations being identified.

In the final two instances, Isaiah 12:2 and 26:4, Jehovah is used by the translators because the Tetragrammaton is modified with אַ (transliterated Yahh) [יָה יהוה] in the context of God's strength thinking it would emphasize God's omnipotence. This is called the emphatic form of the Tetragrammaton.

Had the Authorized Version translators been convinced that "Jehovah" was an accurate representation for the name of God they would have used it for every occurrence of the Tetragrammaton found in the Old Testament manuscripts.

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
